As a result of his unique efforts in literacy education in Brazil, Chile, and other countries, Paulo Freire developed the process of conscientization as authentic education. This process identified literacy with political awareness, enabling the oppressed to acquire both skill and power. Conscientization depends on unique dialogue out of which arises liberating cultural action.

Dr. Freire is the author of the highly acclaimed Pedagogy of the Oppressed,

Education for Critical Consciousness, and Pedagogy in Process.

In McGuinn Auditorium on Tuesday, July 13 at 7:30pm Paulo Freire will present: Education Towards a Critical Conscience for the Catholic School Leadership program of the Boston College School of Education. This will be his only presentation at BC outside of the course he is teaching this session for the Institute. All Institute students have been invited to attend.

ISSUES IN MINISTRY: A FACULTY PANEL

Three times during the summer session selected faculty participate in panel discussions on topics of pastoral and educational concern. Monday, July 12 marks the second panel of the summer, titled: Crucial Issues in Ministry Facing the Church Today, featuring: Edward Braxton, Mary Boys, George MacRae, John McDargh, Sharon Parks, Gerard Egan, and John Shea. The discussion begins at 7:30pm in the New Theater.

WRITING COMPREHENSIVE EXAMS: A SEMINAR

Mary Boys will offer a working seminar on writing comprehensive exams: selecting appropriate topics, researching and writing analytically. The session is designed for those who intend to take comps within the next year and presupposes attendance at the comprehensives preparatory seminar on July 8.

This working seminar will convene on Thursday, 22 July in the Institute's seminar room; one session will be held from 10:15-11:45, and a repeat will be held from 3:30-5:00pm. Select one and sign up with Renate Ricardi, the Institute secretary, by Tuesday, July 19. Since this will be a working seminar, participants are invited to bring with them their work "in progress"—and to bring whatever ideas they have, no matter how vague!

Methods in Theological and Pastoral Research will be conducted by Shawn Copeland, OP, Ph.D. (cand.) on 13-15 July from 5:15-7:15pm. This non-credit workshop is conceived and designed as (1) a general introduction to graduate research in theology-with emphasis on appropriation of critical intellectual skills and the necessity of an ongoing pattern of study to promote these skills; and (2) an introduction to and exploration of fundamental methods, structures of thought, bibliographic resources in the classic categories of theological scholarship.

A variety of strategies will be employed: lectures, one or two brief

CHRISTIAN NONVIOLENCE: A WEEKEND CONFERENCE

For most Christians today, nonviolence is a term which elicits either non-understanding or misunderstanding. Bishops as well as laity, Catholics as well as Protestants know little or nothing of its history, theology, or spirituality. Beyond this, this ignorance is perpetuated in practically all Christian denominations by their unwillingness to use their educational resources to study and to inform their communities about the depth and seriousness of the truth of nonviolence.

The purpose of this conference is to offer, in a short period of time, a qualitative introduction into the history, theology and spirituality of Ohristian nonviolence. Its aim is not to proselytize in order to convert but rather to educate in order to create a new option for internal and external

dialogue in pursuit of the truth of Christ.

The conference will be held at Grotonwood Camp and Conference Center, Groton, MA (room and board), 17-19-September.

INSTITUTE OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AND PASTORAL MINISTRY

GUIDELINES AND SUGGESTIONS FOR TESTING AND EVALUATION OF STUDENTS IN THE INSTITUTE

These suggestions are intended to aid visiting faculty in establishing adequate testing procedures with special attention to the unique situation of visiting faculty and to the demands placed on evaluative instruments.

 Professors are encouraged to give the kinds of tests or other evaluative instruments which elicit analysis and reflective ability, not simply memory retention and recall.

Where memory recall testing is deemed necessary by the professor, one (1) other evaluative instrument of an essay nature should also be employed.

- When professors in the summer session give in-class tests, they are requested to explain the structure and general content of the test early enough in the course to relieve unnecessary anxiety and to encourage the best possible study techniques.
- When feasible, professors are encouraged to test in a manner which invites students to integrate course content with their pastoral experience and ministry.
- 4. When feasible, professors are encouraged to allow individual students an alternative form of testing with good cause.
