



#### INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON NGO ACTION PLANS FOR THE INTERNATIONAL LITERACY YEAR SUMMARY REPORT

Date: 7 ~ 9 September, 1989

Venue: Aomori Kosei-Nenkin Kaikan, Aomori-city, Japan

Subject: The Operation of Unesco Co-Action Learning Centres in the World

Organizers: National Federation of UNESCO Associations in Japan Asian and Pacific Federation of Unesco Clubs and Associations Aomori-ken Unesco Association

#### Background of the conference:

There are currently 960 million illiterate people (over 15 years old) among the world's adult population of 4 billion. Since its foundation in 1946, Unesco has contributed for the betterment of the literacy rate, giving literacy programmes major emphasis. Based on the achievement of Unesco, and considering the International Literacy Year of 1990 which was proclaimed by the United Nations according to the proposal of Unesco as a starting point, we have started to formulate a concrete plan of action.

When Mr. Michael Jackson, a world super-star, visited Japan in 1987 on his Japanese Tour, he approved the request of the National Federation of UNESCO Associations in Japan (the NFUAJ) to provide his personal belongings for auction. Moreover, he willingly consented to issue of Gold Michael Jackson Coin Medals for the Unesco Co-operative Action Programme. The contributions raised through his cooperation were to be utilized for literacy projects conducted by Unesco.

The NFUAJ started to devise a plan to reflect Mr. Jacson's intention fully. It was decided to establish "Unesco Co-Action Learning Centres" where illiterate children and adults can study in cooperation with the solid talent in the recipient projects.

Also, the NFUAJ started nationwide literacy campaign from May 1989 in cooperation with Yomiuri Shimbun Newspaper for the purpose of fundraising as well as for a better understanding of the meaning and object of the International Literacy Year among the Japanese people.



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#### Purpose of the Conference:

The purpose of the conference was to recognize the present fact, that one out of four people in the world is illiterate as a major global problem, and to provide the representatives of "Unesco Co-Action Learning Centres" with opportunities to meet together and share their experiences and views on executing NGO Action Plans for promoting effective operation of "Unesco Co-Action Learning Centres" and to build up a world network.

Participants: 31 participants from 16 countries including 2 representatives from Unesco and UNRWA (List included)
200 Japanese observers

#### Summary Report:

A key note lecture was given by Dr. Paulo Freire under the title of "Literacy as the Fundamental Human Right" following the opening ceremony. Activities reports were made on 11 Unesco Co-Action Learning Centres including UNRWA, two donor countries' NGOs and 5 Unesco Clubs.

Two moderators and three resource persons including a representative of Unesco organized the conference. Reflecting the subjects raised from the representatives of Unesco Co-Action Learning Centres as well as Unesco Club representatives, active discussions were held on the two subjects of "Development and Literacy" and "Problems to execute literacy programmes".

As a result of the exchange of information among the participants, "NGO Action Plans for the International Literacy Year" were adopted unanimously.

#### "LITERACY AS THE FUNDAMENTAL HUMAN RIGHT" Speech by Dr. Paulo Freire

In the human act of education, whether at school or in the home, there is always someone who teaches and someone who is taught. The purpose of educater must be clear. If we look at history, education, particularly in the Third World, has been used as a means to dominate. One may ask whether education is a means towards liberation or to domination of human beings. In this sense, there is a highly political side to education.


Education is the process of learning. The human qualities and cultural backgrounds of those who educate and those who learn must be respected. The teacher who ignores a student who makes a foolish question is not qualified to teach. A teacher is like a midwife who must bring out the best qualities in each student. Education should not be simply the transfer of technical knowledge it must bring about human development. In this sense, the act of education is accompanied by pain, but is at the same time heautiful.


As current director of education for the city of Sao Paulo. I am working for the children living in the streets who are denied the right to education. We are now getting ready to literacy classes in 2,000 locations with 30,000 teachers. Though I am now 67 years old, this exciting work makes be feel 25.

liliterates are not people who are incapable of reading and writing. Literacy is said to be a basic human right, but illiterates are denied many other rights as well. It is essential that illiterates "read the world" before they "read words". In this way, they will become aware of their own situation.

In this world, many people are oppressed, discriminated against, and exploited. But through the act of literacy, they are gaining an awareness of reality and stading up to change this world in which exploitation is a matter of course. This struggle is an act of true love for human beings.



### INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON NGO ACTION PLANS FOR THE INTERNATIONAL LITERACY YEAR (1990)

#### ACTION PLANS

We.

<u>Having gathered</u> in Aomori (Japan) to attend the International Conference on NGO Action Plans for the International Literacy Year on 7 and 8 September 1989 convened by National Federation of Unesco Associations in Japan;

<u>Deeply concerned</u> by the fact that more than a hundred million children in the present world do not have access to school education, and one out of four of the adult population are neither able to read nor write;

Highly appreciating the plan set forth by Unesco aiming at completely eradicating illiteracy and universalizing primary education in the world by the year 2000, starting from the International Literacy Year 1990, with the firm conviction that the promotion of literacy and basic education is indispensable for securing human dignity and fundamental human rights, as well as for social, economic and cultural development of the world community;

Expecting that, with Unesco's assistance, its Member States, Unesco clubs, centers and associations, and interational governmental and non-governmental organizations concerned will make every effort to achieve the afore-mentioned targets;

<u>Having discussed</u> numerous problems encountered, possible solutions in implementing literacy activities, and the roles to be played by Unesco clubs, centers and associations, and other NGOs in this domain;



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Fully supporting Unesco's programme "Education for all by the year 2000";

Convinced that the movement aiming at the establishment of the "Unesco Co-Action Learning Centers" launched as a joint effort of Unesco clubs, centers and associations, Unesco Co-Action Recipients and related NGOs will contribute to increase the ratio of literates as well as improve the quality of life of the people in developing countries;

Strongly recognizing the necessity to exchange information regarding the present situation of illiteracy and literacy activities in the world;

<u>Realizing</u> the importance of mutual co-operation among Unesco clubs, centers and associations, and various NGOs involved in literacy activities, through the network of the World Federation of Unesco Clubs, Centres and Assocations (WFUCA);

<u>Convinced</u> that co-operation with the "Internatinal Task Force on Literacy" (ITFL) established in order to encourage active participation of NGOs in literacy activities, is very effective;

Expressing the hope that Unesco, governments and National Commissions for Unesco, will offer their utmost support and assistance in the light of long-term strategies to those non-governmental activities in the field of literacy;

Also recognizing the importance of the media in disseminating the literacy programmes and activities;

<u>Particularly hoping</u> that the co-operation and assistance of the Japanese government and its National Commission for Unesco to the National Federation



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of Unesco Associations in Japan (NFUAJ), which is expected to play an important role in this field, will be further developed;

Hereby adopt the following action plans:

- (1) Unesco clubs, centers and associations, Unesco Co-Action Recipients and related NGOs should take initiatives for the establishment of as many Unesco Co-Action Learning Centers as possible in the world by the year 2000;
- (2) For this purpose, Unesco clubs, centers and associations, and other related NGOs of the industrialized countries will make efforts to secure funds through Unesco Co-Action Programme, and also assist those Centers by taking various measures including organization of workshops and seminars to train literacy professionals and offering opportunities of the study and research with the assistance of Unesco. and the development of literacy materials in co-operation with the Asian Cultural Centre for Unesco (ACCU) and other organizations concerned;
- (3) The executing bodies of the Learning Centers will make efforts to utilize their Centers for the benefit of people in their learning for the development of their community as well as for the enhancement of the spirit of self-reliance.
